

Section 2 The story of Papua New Guinea

Papua New Guinea (PNG) is an Island country in the Pacific.

- ➤ North of Australia, an island nation.
- ➤ PNG has about 800 plus different languages, vibrant traditional cultures and environmentally it is estimated that PNG harbors more than 5% of the world's biodiversity within some of the world's most biological diverse ecosystems.
- ➤ Many of these organisms are endemic to PNG or the island of New Guinea.
- ➤ PNG consists of the mainland and some 600 offshore islands.
- ➤ PNG has only 2 types of seasons: Wet season and Dry Season
- ➤ PNG is vulnerable to floods, droughts, earthquakes, volcanic activities, tsunamis, and sea-level rise. Some of these are expected to increase in occurrence, extent and intensity


How climate change impact?

How climate change impact?

- 2. With an increased temperatures \rightarrow longer droughts.
- 85% of people living on agriculture, drought makes the people living more difficult;
- → Little to no harvest. With the little that is harvested, it caters for family meals, since there are no surplus, families are unable to sell to buy other needs;
- With few rainwater, gardens become a wasteland;
- Few rain water, → affect basic hygiene and sanitation

How girls & women lives affected by Climate Change?

- In PNG society, men are people with power and making decision, while women and girls are stewards of families, responsible for household work such as sourcing for water, childbearing and rearing
- Living is harder under the changes of climate, and girls and women need to work harder to meet the basic needs of families and households, e.g. they have to walk long distances to find fresh water.

Section 3 Case Study: Climate refugeesCarteret Islanders

- The Carteret Islands is made up of 7 atolls with the highest point of just 1.5 metres
- Tuluun (meaning Ocean People), the Carteret set their island home and from the sea.
- Since 1994 they have lost about 50 per cent of their land, traditional food sources have become scarce, communities also faced severe water shortages due to prolonged droughts and sea-level rising that affected their freshwater supply.
- In 2005, the Carteret islanders were named the world's first "climate refugees."
- Increasing sea levels forced them out of their homes and they now live in resettlement camps on the outskirts of Buka Town



3R Action - "Reduce, Reuse & Recycle"

Reduce is creating less waste;

Here are some ways you can reduce the amount of waste you make:

- Pack your lunch in a lunchbox/reusable container-Paper and plastic begs create a huge amount of waste-and plastic begs take hundreds of years to decompose!
- Bring reusable begs to the grocery store/for shopping.
- Say no to bottled water- instead of buying bottled water, use a reusable water bottle.
- Watch what you buy-when you're at the supermarket pay attention to the packaging. Can this be cleaned out and used for something else?



2.Reuse

- Find a new use for an old item.
- Have a garage sale: There's someone out there who would love to have them. A garage sale is a great way to clean out your space and help reuse all the items you don't want. You can make a little money too! Items not sold can also be donated to a local charity.

Action

- **3. Recycle** is changing discarded material into new products in order to avoid using more virgin resources.
- Some ways to recycle:
- Make recycling bins readily available in your home/school/office.
 Have each bin labeled paper, plastic, metal, glass etc.
- Collect Aluminum cans, bottles, paper/card boxes and sell to recycle sites.
- Use large plastic containers as planters. With the use of some paint add deco on the outside and you're good to go!
- Convert old sheets, towels and clothing into wash rags
