A giraffe on the Wall!

My first memory of Girls' Brigade was when I was not even yet in school and my local company had a 'bring-a-friend' night. A friend who was already in Girls' Brigade bought me along (I must have nearly been school age to be allowed to go along). My only memory from that night is something to do with a giraffe on a wall. The theme for the night was Africa I think, but it must have been fun because by the time I was old enough, I was going to Girls' Brigade.

I then proceeded to go through Cadets, Juniors, Seniors and Pioneers. I had different friends come and go over the years, but I am thankful that there were always other Christian girls with whom I could make friends there. I attended Church, but there were not many other girls my age there, and at my school I had friends who were girls but were not Christian, so Girls' Brigade filled that void of friends who were both Christian and girls.

I think more importantly, though, Girls' Brigade helped fill my spiritual need – well not Girls' Brigade itself, but it pointed me toward God, who ultimately does. There in that Church, every Thursday evening, I would faithfully be taught Bible stories and truths from the Bible. I can picture myself sitting on the mat as a little cadet, probably not grasping the full implications of the devotion we were doing but storing it up in my heart and mind. Week after week, and year after year, Girls' Brigade built a strong foundation for me, one built on Christ and in the Bible.

As I continued to grow up and grow in my relationship with Christ I began to realise how much of a privilege it is that I was able to learn about God and the Bible. Not just in my childhood, but in general – the privilege that I live in a country where Christianity is allowed; where organisations like Girls' Brigade can run; where I have the Bible in my mother tongue; where I can attend Church and have fellowship with other believers. These things which were true for me, are not true for the majority of the world.

And that has begun to shape and transform how I am using this life God has given me. I have just returned from England where I spent two years studying the Bible and training for cross cultural missions, becoming equipped so that I can go to parts of the world and share the Good News that Christ has died and paid for our sins, and also risen, so that we may have eternal life.

I would say undoubtedly my time in Girls' Brigade has helped as I travel this road that God is putting before me. As I already mentioned – the Biblical foundation it gave me – but taught me responsibility, how to run games, prepare crafts, and give devotions. Pretty much everything that is needed to serve in ministry at any local Church, I was able to learn at Girls' Brigade.

Can I encourage you, that while this journey God takes us on as we submit to His Lordship can be scary; it can be uncertain; sometime is very hard, but it is also exciting? It is fun. 
Leadership 2016 was no exception, as we shared an amazing journey with 95 young women from around Australia and the Solomon Islands!

Some of my fondest memories are of my time in the Junior and Senior Section. Each Monday night started with Scripture. We worked through our workbook and had great fun learning our memory verse Mr. Lynn, our teacher at the time, always rewarded our hard work with a fruit pastille. I loved the chance to discuss and learn alongside my friends.



When I was an Associate I was attending the Church of Ireland College of Education training to be a primary school teacher. I made the decision to go on a short-term mission trip and chose to travel with the organisation, Samaritan's Purse. We went to Russia and hosted a holiday camp for two weeks for street children. Through my work in Girls' Brigade, I aim to be an example to the girls I work with. I hope to encourage them to grow into strong women who are prepared to face the challenges of life, to help them build life-long friendships and to inspire them to always be the best that they can be!

It is a privilege to be able to touch into so many young lives, both through the giving of shoeboxes internationally and through my work in Girls' Brigade, in my local community and it is a privilege I hope, to continue for years to come.


Girls' Brigade Nigeria also takes care of the widows and orphans both within and outside the Girls' Brigade.

This year Girls' Brigade Nigeria has sponsored 26 girls through Primary and High School education. We also sponsor girls to many programs both local and International, in order to expose them and have them interact with others.

13th Waitakere Girls' Brigade — New Zealand



In 2015 Girls' Brigade New Zealand partnered with the New Zealand Bible Society to provide Bibles for all girls in Girls' Brigade and Icon For Girls'.

The makeup of the Bible was a combined effort as the girls were involved with designing the cover of the bible and providing content.

With sponsorship and donations, the Bible was underway and in 2016 we received our shipment from the printers. Then began the task of distribution to the girls. For some of the girls this was exciting as they now had their own Bible.

The providing of the Bible has been fruitful for one company who in 2017 based the Spiritual part of their programme on using the Bible. Initially the girls were asked look at their Bible and tell the Leaders how many books in the Bible were in the names of women, once that was decided the girls were asked which of the books did they want to read. The decision was Esther and from there it was a fruitful and overflowing year of using the Bible.

Every week we continued with the story of Esther with each girl taking part in the reading and then we would discuss the passage. The enthusiasm of the girls was evident in the way they brought their Bibles each week and were anxious to continue the story.

At the end of the six week there was disappointment, when the decision was made to keep the book of Ruth, until 2018 when we will continue to read Ruth's Story.



Clara Hewston — 40th Manorhamilton — Ireland

My name is Clara Hewston and I am a member of 40th Manorhamilton Girls' Brigade, Ireland. I started Girls' Brigade at 6 months of age attending a camp with my mother who is the Captain and who opened the Company in our rural town in 1997. Our Company began with 17 girls and now is flourishing with 100 girls of all ages.

I officially!!! became a member of Girls' Brigade as a Tiny Tot at the age of 3 years and I always remember how proud I was in my uniform. I have come up through Explorers, Juniors, Seniors and Brigaders and have only missed one night because of pneumonia over the 15 years. I did try and get into the car that night when I was 1!!!!! Last year I was delighted to be awarded my Brigaders brooch by Vice Patron of Girls' Brigade

While attending Girls' Brigade 2 years ago, I had to participate in a business competition in school. I had no idea what to do and scared it was beyond me, but I decided to bring how I had learnt the skills and talents I had which, was shown to me in Girls' Brigade, to bring this idea and the way of learning in a visual way in Girls' Brigade into my school project. I produced a children's

baking book using pictures and no words to help children, especially those with difficulties, like myself, in reading a recipe to learn to bake. This idea brought me to New York to represent Ireland.

Learning different ways has also come into our Bible teaching. All our members learn the Bible stories through crafts, baking, drama and flag ministry. It has shown me there are so many ways to teach and this has enabled me to grow in my own faith as God has shown me different ways to help others and be who I am through the encouragement of our Girls' Brigade Leaders.

I have been leading the Tiny Tots and Junior Explorers over the years in all areas of the Girls' Brigade programme, and so this year I am stepping out in faith as I start the International Award. I have decided to get involved in Messy Church where I will be encouraging and teaching children of all ages many Bible lessons in a visual and practical way.

Just like Girls' Brigade but now sharing what I have learnt in Girls' Brigade to others in our community.

So, looking back, what does Girls' Brigade mean to me. Having a learning difficulty, I find it very challenging in school as I have a huge difficulty in reading and understanding words. I always find Girls' Brigade is a place to relax, be cared for and especially a place where I learn new talents and skills in a very practical, and a very visual way. I have taken part in dance, baking, crafts, games, sewing activities, Bible teaching, camps and so much more.

Through the involvement in Messy Church recently, I have

now applied and been accepted to be part of an Exodus Mission team, where I will be travelling to Romania to teach children's Clubs and camps for a week. This is such a wonderful opportunity and one that I would never have had if it wasn't from being a member of Girls' Brigade.

One of my personal favourite things in Girls' Brigade is seeing girls younger than me who have difficulties, and how Girls' Brigade has changed and impacted their lives for the better. Over the years in Girls' Brigade I have been encouraged by my Leaders to help other girls who are in our Company, who have a disability or a learning difficulty to help and care for them and show them their potential.

Overall being a member of Girls' Brigade has taught me that having a learning difficulty in Girls' Brigade doesn't make a difference as we are encouraged to remember that God makes us all unique, and loves each one of us, and our Leaders tell us all the time to have faith in ourselves and put our trust in God as it says in Matthew 19 v 26 "all things are possible with God".

Leesa Flynn – Manorhamilton Girls' Brigade - Ireland



My name is Leesa Flynn and I was a member of 40th Company Manorhamilton Girls' Brigade for fourteen years. I still remember my first few nights at Girls' Brigade. At the young age of four, I was busily doing arts and crafts and learning my Do This, Do That with all of my newly made friends. My first Display was a very exciting night. I remember playing the role of Little Red Riding Hood, for which my late aunty Geraldine made me my very own red costume. I was so excited to be part of a performance which was displayed to all of our equally proud parents on the night. I remember sitting eagerly waiting for my prize at the end of the Display and

feeling so proud of myself when our Captain, Shirley Hewston, called out my name for my Tiny Tots prize.

However, my experience of the Girls' Brigade may be seen as being somewhat different to that of my peers. I was born with Spina Bifida, meaning I have been between a wheelchair and eventually a walking frame for my entire life. Being a member of Manorhamilton Girls' Brigade has definitely helped to shape me as a person, irrespective of my disability and even at a very young age I learned through being a member that having Spina Bifida will not disable me from achieving, just as my peers have done.

In 2008, I got the very exciting news from my Captain, Shirley Hewston, that I had been nominated for the Girls' Brigade International Endurance Award. I was only eleven at this time, even being nominated for this prestigious award was more than I could have possibly imagined.

In the November of 2008, myself and my parents received the phone-call from Shirley. that we had all been dreaming of, I had actually won the Girls' Brigade International Endurance Award.

To say I was ecstatic is a complete understatement. I still remember clearly, arriving at our weekly Girls' Brigade night, the following Thursday, unaware that my fellow members knew anything about the award, and being greeted with claps and cheers from everyone when I came through the door. It was such a proud moment for me.

The night of December the 8th 2008 is a night that is forever etched in my mind. This was the night that I was officially presented with the Girls' Brigade International Endurance Award. I can remember all my family and a few of my friends arriving at my house and getting ready to go to my local Community Centre where the presentation would take place. The event itself was far beyond my expectations. On arriving, there was a photographer recording the whole event, there was music playing, each table

had a little cardboard angel with my face on it, which the girls had all been working hard, unbeknownst to me. They had also all worked hard on making me a congratulations banner which was so beautiful. Having all my loved ones, friends, Leaders, as well as my fellow members there to celebrate my special night with me was so wonderful. Then the time came for me to be presented with the award by the then President Joan Darling. Our Captain, Shirley gave a wonderful speech about my time in Girls' Brigade which was so emotional. I was then presented with my award in the form of a beautiful brooch, which I wore proudly on my uniform for the entirety of my time in Girls' Brigade. It was so overwhelming and to this day, I still cannot fully believe that I was the recipient of an International Endurance Award.

In 2016, the year that I did my Leaving Certificate, I had to say a very emotional goodbye to the Company that had given me an abundance of happy memories over the past 14 years of my life. While working on my Queen's Award, I learnt new skills and set personal targets, that tested me and took me out of my comfort zone. One element of the award was a residential, called the Esther Generation Weekend. In October 2015 I went on the weekend at Cliff College in Derbyshire. Anne Browse, 61, President of Methodist Women in Britain 2015-2017, has shared how being a member of Girls' Brigade impacted her.

She was a member of 1st Thatcham Girls' Brigade in Berkshire as a child and later a Leader who helped run the Region 6, South West England, Summer Camp.

Anne says 'I knew from about age 14 that I wanted to teach, encouraged by opportunities to be trained to lead a Sunday School class and to help with the younger children in my Girls' Brigade group. Both the Methodist Church and Girls' Brigade have been crucial in recognising, acknowledging and developing leadership potential in young people over many years, for which I personally owe a debt of gratitude.'

Girls' Life Brigade started when Anne was 5 at Thatcham Methodist Church and she remembers her first evening vividly.

She says 'We had Plasticine to play with and I thought the aim was to make something and if the Leaders couldn't guess what it was then you won. I made tadpoles, but the Leaders thought they



were coat hooks, so I was pretty pleased.'

Anne stayed with the group until she was 18 and left to attend university but she attended the Region 6 Summer Camp until the age of 23 when she started her first teaching post. She then went on to lead the camp for around 30 years.

She says 'It was great to be part of such a committed team of adults prepared to give up their holiday and spend it in a field, when it wouldn't be their preference, because they knew the experience for young people is so valuable. I used to love the sense of wonder as to what God was going to do with the week in a field.'

Anne has 3 children and her youngest daughter Katie, 24, is now the current co-leader of the camp.

Anne, of Devon, is the out-going President of Methodist Women in Britain 2015-2017, an independent charity within the worldwide Methodist Church, and in a recent blog (LINK) shared the impact her first GB captain had on her.

She says 'Joyce Abbott is 91 and still in Thatcham, she started the group with Marjorie Royle, who has since died. Their commitment to us and willingness to turn up every Friday night to work with us was incredible.

'When I meet up with people across the country and tell a story about Girls' Brigade many of them share their own... so many people, even if not now involved, found Girls' Brigade really formative when they were young.'

Amanda Allchorn, 60, is Chair of the Girls' Brigade Ministries' Trustee Board. She's married, has two children and recently became a granny for the first time.

I started at 1st Eastbourne Girls' Brigade when I was about 13 because my best friend Sarah went along and invited me to go with her. I liked it because of the games and fun so I got more involved and got a uniform.

During my secondary school years, I went to boarding school, but the Girls' Brigade Leaders kept in touch and I went back to Girls' Brigade during the holidays.

My family had been through a divorce and, coming from that situation, Girls' Brigade gave me a sense of glue and belonging, which was very special. I remember being made welcome and encouraged, to get involved and take up the opportunities they were offering.

I came from a Catholic and Anglican tradition, but Girls' Brigade was based at Victoria Baptist Church. After I stopped going to GB I went to a youth group at the Church and I remember getting involved with the Christian Union at school, becoming a Christian in my teens.

In 1975 I went into banking in Eastbourne and started work for a Barclays HR team, a few years after moving to London.

In 1996 I started working for the Barclays Community Affairs Programme - which included education initiatives, then in 2005 I was called to work at the Baptist Union of Great Britain (BUGB) as Head of Communications. After BUGB I took on the role of National Director for The Rooftop at Viz-A-Viz Ministries, following that I began to mix portfolio work with developing a Waterways Chaplaincy based at the Diocese of St Albans. I'll be commissioned as a Waterways Chaplain in the summer this year.

I'm almost at the end of a three-year training programme at the London Centre of Spiritual Direction to become a spiritual director - with a special focus on women in leadership and women over 50. I am also leading women's retreats.

I joined St Jude's 4th Company of the Girls' Brigade when I was 3 years old. My two older sisters were already Explorers and I wanted to go with them to Girls' Brigade. At one stage four of the five girls in my family were in Girls' Brigade at the same time. Every Saturday afternoon we ran up to St Jude's Church Hall for Girls' Brigade where our Captain - Miss Millie Pemberton, would be waiting for us in her black gym trousers, black long sleeved top and funny black gym shoes. She was such a lovely lady - kind, compassionate and generous and someone I greatly admired.

We would begin with roll call followed by marching, PE

exercises, do this / do that, verse speaking and singing for the Feis, scripture and arts and crafts. Girls' Brigade was the social highlight of our week doing the different activities and meeting our friends. At the end of the session, we lined up to get a jelly sweet out of a brown paper bag. Miss Pemberton would say "taking a pace forward - dismissed" and we would take a step forward and salute her.

When we joined the Junior / Senior section our Girls' Brigade sessions started in the church with 30 minutes of scripture. We learned different stories from the Bible each year – parables of Jesus, miracles of Jesus, Old Testament characters and had an annual scripture exam. We also learned passages of scripture for our memory verses that I have never forgotten and always associate with Girls' Brigade. Passages like Romans 8 verses 35 – 39 - "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ" and Isaiah 53 verses 4 - 9 - "All we like sheep have gone astray" and Psalm 23 - "The Lord is my Shepherd" and Exodus 20 verses 1 – 17 - "The 10 Commandments". We had lovely scripture teachers who taught us really well.

The Girls' Brigade scripture exam was the only exam in my life that I ever achieved 100%. But much more than that, I believe learning those stories and particularly the memory verses influenced me greatly.

Westside IFG: (Icon for Girls, New Zealand)

Praise God! Westside IFG has been going for four years but this term has been amazing! On Thursday 26 October 2017, 10 girls became Christians and 1 made a recommitment! And the majority of these girls were from families that are not Church going families.

We had been working through a series of devotions on the big story of Christianity. At the end of term 3 family night, the gospel had been presented in pictures using the snakes and ladders version. (The Fall meant humans slid down the snake to the Kingdom of Evil and the Cross is a ladder to climb back up to the Kingdom of God.)

During term four the girls were working their way through each section of the story. After the Fall devotion that included "Do we have to believe in Jesus to be able to spend eternity with God?" the leader asked, "Are you friends with God? If you aren't and you want to become friends with Him tonight, say this prayer after me. I'm going to pray..." and she read out the prayer, so they could decide if they wanted to pray it. She got everyone to close their eyes so there would be no peer pressure and said for the girls to pray the prayer in their head to God if they wanted to.

She then read it out line by line, so they could repeat it. After the prayer she asked all the girls to keep their eyes shut and to put their hand up if they had chosen to pray the prayer to God. II hands went up! Wow!!! Many of these girls have been coming for years and have previously said "I'm not ready yet" when asked "Who has already made the decision before? Who would like to make the decision now? Who would like to come to IFG to learn more?". But that night was the night! We also had one girl make a decision at camp in March so that makes II first time commitments!


One, possibly unique feature which we encourage other groups to copy, is that we have one leader whose role is to hang out with the families while IFG is on and journey with them. Two parents have come to faith through this and two more are well on the way. The Long Story Short and the Christianity Explored DVD Series have been used along the way amongst the many hours of hanging



out talking life together.

We also took these mums on our church Women's Retreat Weekend which is specifically designed for people to be able to explore the faith; carefully chosen conversation starters at meal times. Saturday night camp fire facilitated conversation to answer the questions about Christianity that people put in the question box over the weekend, and lots of relaxation and time for conversations and friendships.

One of the main contributing factors to these 13 people making decisions was prayer. Once the IFG leaders starting to pray together each night before the programme started, stuff started to happen. Once an older lady in the Church asked for a family to pray for, stuff started to happen for the family; not only did the mum become a Christian but her daughter, two granddaughters and two great nieces were five of the girls who gave their life to



Christ. There has also been a lot of prayer going on in Christchurch for the city for God to move in a greater way. We are seeing it!

We hope that our story is an encouragement to all kids' leaders; the hard work pays off. Remember to regularly ask your kids if they want to become a friend of God, giving them the 'keep coming to IFG to learn more' option too.

My Brigade Journey – Avril Geswint – South Africa

At a young age of 12 year, I started my Brigade journey. I started as a Senior, under the guidance of the late Captain Sarah King. Four years later due, to her health the Company was put in recess. I was trained as a young leader by the late Mrs. Violet Japtha and the late Annie Jansen.





With this void in my life and no other Girls' Brigade in the Area, I joined the Boys' Brigade, which was very active at the time. Under the stern leadership of Captain Jan Minnies, I trained as an Officer. I had two Companies under my wing. The day of my initial induction as a Boys' Brigade Officer, I was part of the colour party and standing at the Church door with so many mixed emotions I could not go through with the induction and left.

In the year 1986 the Resident Minister's wife, Mrs. Joan Meyer, and I started to form a Company at our Church. Struggling to keep the girls interested was a trying task and the Company went into recess. In 1990 I decided to resuscitate the Company, 60 aspirant girls joined and in 1991 on the 15 October we were commissioned as the 1St Springdale Company and still active today, under very challenging circumstances, due to the crime rate and many obstacles in our community.

In 1992 we were chosen by the late Ms. Edith Phillips, the National Training Officer at the time, to have a display evening for the United Congregational Church of Southern Africa Synod Conference of Women.

I felt so proud and honoured, that our Company was chosen and seeing my former Captain also in attendance.

Becoming one of the Margaret O'Rourke recipients was another honour bestowed on me, and this entitled me to equip myself further, for the benefit of the Girls' Brigade. I could do a computer course. Unfortunately, I could not continue in the advance I.T. courses due to lack of funds but gained experience in the years ahead.

Exactly 21 years ago today the 16 March 1997 as I am

writing this, our fatal accident happened in which Ms. Edith Phillips, our National Training Officer died. I was told that I will never walk again. THROUGH GOD'S UNFAILING GRACE HERE I AM. Sharing my experience with you all. ALL PRAISE TO GOD.

In 1998 at the Magalies Berg Conference I was elected as the National Secretary of South Africa invery trying circumstances. Never will I forget the love and patience and assistance of Mrs. Ruth Chikasa the Africa President at the time, who gave me her National Secretary lanyard. We shared our joy and sorrow at that Conference. At the same Conference many relationships were formed, and today I am part of a great team of women worldwide who so lovingly serve God.

The very same year I attended the I.C.G.B. in Brisbane Australia. Six of us remained behind after the Conference and what an experience living in a back-packers complex and exploring Brisbane.

We were invited by the Mayor of Brisbane to a fingertip lunch and late that week we had dinner on one the riverboats on the Brisbane River.

In 1999 we had our National Conference at the Willows Holiday Resort. After sitting at the station for some time, Mrs. Ruth Chikasa managed to attend the Conference as a special Guest being the Africa Chairperson. Once again Mrs. Ruth Chikasa came to my aid, something which I will never forget, and I am very grateful for knowing such a noble person.

The year 2000 Scotland hosted a Gathering to celebrate 100 years of the Girls Guildry. Upon our arrival at

Heathrow airport, we had to improvise and realised we had to spend wisely. We did something out of character. We paid for one to use the bathroom facilities and one stayed at the door to give each one a chance to refresh, by keeping the door open. TRUST THAT GOD HAS FORGIVEN US.

Arriving at the Scotland my suitcase was ripped upon, but the authorities replaced it. I was hosted by a lovely couple, the father of the house, was preparing to go to the survival camp shown on T. V. The highlight of the Conference was when we visited the Scottish Bagpipe Tattoo display.

2003 Botswana our All Africa Conference held at the beautiful stone Church. Travelling by bus to Botswana, stopping at the border for inspection, here I am with all the Conference fees of the members pinned to my underwear, having members with chronic ailments, arriving a day to early due to incorrect information received. Trying to keep the delegates calm, finding a shop to buy food for the evening, trying to get hold of the Brigade officials to arrange accommodation, was very challenging, but once again we serve a living God who solves problems when we can't. The Government invited us to a lovely lunch while we were there. One day the members enjoyed riding on the back of a truck to take us to a special hiking trail, where we climbed a steep hill that overlooked part of Botswana.

2005 Another challenging time with Me forgetting my vanity case with all my chronic medication at home. I could manage to bring greetings from South Africa and hand over a shield as token of Fellowship from our

Country. After that I had to endure endless pain and swelling by trying alternative medication. I had to ask one of our delegates to do the presentation at the museum due to this. At least I could see the Victoria-falls and have some fellowship with other others. One of the memories of Zambia is Sheila forcing delegates to eat their food, because back home people were starving.

2008 Nigeria, another memorable experience. The youth was my inspiration and our special escort Ike was amazing. The beautiful Church with its revolving alter and meeting a representative of their Government, a Women of integrity and grace. We also had a tour of their Parliament and of the city.

My special memory is when they made me a going home outfit within two hours. This was hilarious. It was raining and when I arrived at Abuja airport I was blue to the waist. The dye came out, luckily, I had my tracksuit in my overnight luggage bag. WAS MY FACE RED? What an experience. I still correspond with some of the Youth.

Kenya Walk by faith not by sight: After the Executive meeting at the Bible School, those members who had later flights were hosted by some members. The youth decided to host me. The morning after the meeting after most of the members left, I woke up to complete silence. What next. I went to Breakfast and here the Youth was waiting for me. Walking from the Bible School I had no clue where I was going to. The girls took turns carrying to the 1st taxi after that another 2 taxis then a bus. Eventually we arrived at our destination in the war zone. After 2 hours we had security clearance as the soldiers were staying at the same hostel.

The Sunday morning, we went to the Church called Revival

Ministries held at a very huge athletic field, my ministry started with the age group 4-6 then 7-9 and so on. Each had their own leader. Which was amazing thereafter the youth and young adults lastly the congregation of close to 2000. This I did not expect. Walking up to the podium and looking back my heart skipped a beat, I have to address this huge crowd of followers with so many Clergy and Pastors present I ministered a few words and started singing to them the Lutkin Benediction, because I was to leave within the next hour. I was so humbled by the humility of the church members and when the Bishop's wife ran to get me a bottle of water I could not stop my tears. The Church members were so surprised when their Bishop gave me a 1 Dollar bill for coffee. They could not believe their eyes.

Tanzania: Another Conference to remember, Visit to Serengeti Wild life Park a worthwhile 6-hour journey. Once again under God's protection, when the one bus had a burst tyre and later again went into a ditch, with the Delegates crawling out of the bus. Delegates could not understand why I was so emotional, I relived the accident we had, and I suppose it was, because Maria was one of the members in the other bus. There were so many flight delays that we literally slept at the airport. When we arrived in Dara Salaam we were put in an unknown place, which felt very unsafe, our breakfast was one hardboiled egg and a mug of black coffee and a slice of hard bread in a burnt plate. Once again being grateful for what we have. I had to tell my fellow Officers that we must go out to see where we were.

The International Youth Camp in Stellenbosch also had

its challenges, even though I had to spend some hours in the Medical Centre. This made me more determined than ever to persevere and serve God more faithfully and sincerely.

After serving as National Secretary since 1998, I was elected as President in 2011. And served in that position for two terms.

My last I.C.G.B. in Perth where old friendships were rekindled. This great warrior of Christ who crossed my path through Girls' Brigade will never be forgotten. Women of strength, Integrity, women who serves God unconditionally. Another special person who has taught me to never give up is our Immediate past Africa Fellowship President Ms. Priscilla Penny

I vow to serve God as long as I am able and feel proud to be part of this group of women. May you find much joy as I have in serving our Lord.

Rev Amica Liburd's Story

Methodist minister Rev Amica Liburd, is a young ordained minister stationed with the Guyana District of the Methodist Church. She is a Nevisian by birth, who was a life-long member of the Girls' Brigade Company attached to Gingerland Methodist Church in Nevis. She shared during an encounter with her in summer 2017, that whilst she was a youth various ordained ministers of the church saw and approached her on her potential in formal ministry.

She shared that she repeatedly declined their offers to assist her in taking that path, because (a) she was focused on pursuing a career in disaster management and aviation; and (b) she had personal spiritual issues that she struggled with. However, she surprisingly shared that the transformative moment in her life came when she attended the 2002 ICGB in Thailand as a youth delegate, because the sessions there were so spiritually charged that it caused her to confront the spiritual issues, that were hindering her and brought her into a closer connection with God.

She described a paradigm shift that effectively 'stopped her in her tracks' so much so that when she returned home from ICGB and she tried to continue her track in preparation for attending university that year, she simply could not continue. Instead, later that year she ended up switching majors and enrolling as a Theological student instead as of her selected major.

It was those seeds which were planted in her from her infancy as an explorer in Girls' Brigade which were honed at an ICGB encounter, which gave her a for love Girls' Brigade which has followed her into her professional life as an ordained minister. It is now her modern mission, to work with Churches in Guyana for the establishment of Girls' Brigade and Boys' Brigade throughout the various congregations in the circuits of the entire District of the Guyana Methodist Church. A true testament of 1 Corinthians 3:6, when we are asked to plant the seeds and the Lord will provide the increase.



Ethelwynne's Story – My Life – Enriched through Girls' Brigade

In 1955 as one of the Sunday School teachers of the bean Street Methodist Church in Kimberley, I was introduced to The Girls' Life Brigade (GLB) by Officers of the Boys' Brigade (BB) company which has just started in our Church. I was immediately fascinated by all that I learnt and became the proposed Captain of the GLB company we started.

Then, to my amazement and, I believe, was part of God's plan for my life, my future husband whom I met in Bulawayo, Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) in June 1957, and who came from the village of Pniel in the Western Cape, happened to be an Officer in the Boys' Brigade there, and when we married in December 1959, I became the Captain of the GLB company in Pniel as there were no leaders. In 1960 I completed an officer's correspondence course with Brigade International and was officially inducted as Captain of the 1st Pniel Company in August 1960.

I found the Aim, Motto and Principles and programme of the organization to be just what was needed to uplift and prepare our girls to become steadfast, upright Christian women.

In 1965 I attended the gathering in Port Elizabeth presided over by the International Secretary, Miss Rae, to form a National Council of GLB in South Africa and I later served as National President for GBSA. Subsequently Districts and Regions were formed. My husband understood that GLB had become my passion in life.

In 1972 I was one of a delegation of six officers from South Africa who attended the International Conference and Council Meetings held in Auckland, New Zealand.

The Lord blessed the work of Girls' Brigade in South Africa and companies were formed in all provinces of the country. Serving as a training officer was most rewarding at a time when GBLSA was threatened due to strife and the resignation of high-ranking Officers, I vowed, being then a member of the Executive, that while there were companies around the country and girls to be served and led, Girls' Brigade South Africa would survive and I found myself serving as both National Secretary and National President for a short period of time and through the grace of God and supportive clergy we survived. I later became the National Secretary which office I held for 15 years.

I was blessed to present Girls' Brigade South Africa at International Conferences respectively in Singapore in 1983 and in the Cayman Islands in 1988. God graced me with a loving supportive husband and three wonderful children, who despite my involvement in Girls' Brigade, locally, regionally and nationally thrived and assisted me in every way.

In 1993 at an International Conference in Dublin, Ireland I was humbled and honoured to be elected as an International Vice President. My responsibility was to strengthen Girls' Brigade in African countries and to train Officers. Through the grace of God, I was able to attend International Management Committee Meetings for the purpose of drawing up a new structure for the newly-formed International Girls' Brigade Organisation – a result of the amalgamation of three organisations i.e. The GLB of England, the Girls' Brigade of Ireland and The Girls' Guildry of Scotland which all had similar goals.

I have been further enriched and blessed by being able to attend conferences and meetings in Australia, Hong Kong, England, Scotland and the Bahamas and gained invaluable knowledge of the values and instruction available for girls in all walks of life.

I am so grateful and thankful that during the course of my service in Africa I was able to visit and/or run training courses in Zambia, Zimbabwe, Kenya, Uganda, Namibia, Swaziland and Botswana. Through the grace of God and Girls' Brigade I have been able to store up immeasurable memories and reached great heights which otherwise would have been unattainable.

Thank you, Lord, for friends in Girls' Brigade near and far.

Influence - Mary Mokoroa from Cook Islands

We all have our stories to tell and growing up in one of the most beautiful, relaxing, peaceful, friendly small islands in the Pacific; known to us as paradise; we are truly blessed. Kia orana my name is Mary Mokoroa.

My parents were among the many that chose to migrate to the main island of Rarotonga in the late 1960's. Three of my siblings were born in Rarotonga, which the two eldest are now deceased. The third child; a boy; now resides in



Australia, the youngest born on the island of Penrhyn is now residing back at home; previously being an Auckland resident. Each of them has their own respected families. As for the prodigal child, the black sheep of the family, she was born on the island of Atiu where Girls' Brigade started in the Cook Islands; also, the home island of my father; whom now works and resides in the metropolis; the beautiful "Rarotonga". Like most Cook Islands families; we had a house with revolving doors, with relatives coming & going. We went to Church, but for me, I did not understand what the pastor was saying; although I was top of my class for Sunday school; became Dux at some point.

My father; the late "Teati Mokoroa" worked as the Deputy Registrar for the High Courts—Justice Departments; which my mother the late "Matai Mokoroa nee Toma" worked as Marine Librarian for the Marine Resources Department in our township. To make ends meet, my parents would grow taro, arrowroot crops to sell at the market on some odd Saturdays; my mother would cook and sew our island clothes; so, she doesn't have to go and buy us clothes. That kind of life seemed the norm with little knowledge of the world existing outside our little nation.

I came to realise the kind of hardship my parents went through. I don't remember my parents ever moaning about how tough life was. As a young adult, I have learnt to listen and learn about their life. My mother and I use to have this "coffee session" every night where she spoke fondly of those days; "I use to feed you all on a can of corn beef with rukau and taro"; she would say proudly. Coz now days it's one can corn beef per person. She'd share her past; stories I love to hear, and I would share my young adolescent problems and we would solve them together; it's one part I really love about these coffee sessions, which I still do now, just reminiscing about the good old days.

We weren't always allowed to do what we wanted to do as children, but we weren't slaves to our television sets either. In the 1980's & 1990's before Xbox, Wii and internet, there was always something to do in our backyard or our neighbours place. Working in the plantation; growing vegetation; crops; playing hide and seek; swinging on vines over streams; swimming in the streams; feed the pigs, the dogs, the cats, play re-enactments of army wars in tall grass, climbing trees; gardening; cutting the grass; raking the rubbish; making kikau brooms; weaving etc

As I got older, I joined Girls' Brigade; recruited into the Avarua Company by the former captain Mrs Helen Williams; I was six years old. Worked my way up the ranks, from being a Junior unto becoming a Young Leader. Completed primary and high school education; started working and saw a bit more of the "world." At the same time completing and receiving my Girls' Brigade Queens Award at 19yrs (2004); became an officer at 20yrs (20005). Attended my first Pacific Fonomarae based here in Rarotonga; completed and received my Duke of Edinburgh - Bronzes at 20yrs (2006). In 2007 I completed my silver and Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award



and received it at 23yrs (2009). I'm grateful for the decision I made and support shown and given to me, my late parents; Girls' Brigade Avarua-Officers; members; because today, I am currently the Captain for the Girls' Brigade Avarua Company; since 2012 and now Girls' Brigade Cook Islands, National Secretary since 2017. Simple beginnings, huge dividends in Christian faith through Girls' Brigade – Rev Margaret Stella Constable – South Africa

(A personal testimony of the Rev Margaret Constable on her growth through Girls' Brigade)

Girls' Life Brigade became one of the social organisational activities in which parents were encouraging Christian young ladies to become involved during the 1930's. The Second World War had just broken out in 1939 when I became a Cadet in the local company started at Philip Memorial Congregational Church in Sidwell, Port Elizabeth, South Africa. The company was also attached to a Church School at which I received my primary school education viz Korsten Union Congregational Church school.

Our first Officers were Captain Fredricka Blignaut, Mrs Bruwer and Mrs Lasker, they introduced us to this life of discipline, Christian leadership and instruction in practical skills in handwork. They excelled in training us in music, singing stage productions, sketches and operettas. Working with them (They were also our day school teachers) brought a feast of most enjoyable cultural activities into my life. It awakened within me a love for handwork, sewing, crochet work and knitting.

As mentioned, the Second World War (1939-1945) had just broken out. There were at that stage not enough factories to provide for the physical needs of the military. Our Brigade Company became one of the first to become a "knitting circle". We learnt to convert the uninteresting khaki stands of wool into jerseys, scarves, balaclava, caps, gloves and stockings. We also became the Junior Red Cross and were trained in First Aid and Home Nursing. We could not have imagined that in years to come, during adulthood our training in knitting and sewingembroidery, stitching and mending would stand us in good stead. Yes, for training in these skills truly prepared us for adulthood, the accent being on practical activities. Even today as I am advancing in years I am truly indebted to my trainers, these first Brigade Officers for the thorough grounding in these skills. They have now become the hobbies that occupy my time as the aging process can also become very lonely and lead to boredom.

I was always just a member of the Company, never having the privilege of becoming an Officer. During the years after age 16 that I could have been promoted I had to attend advance studies at the University of Fort Hare. This happened during the mid-fifties in Alice away from Port Elizabeth.

The foundation received via Girls' Brigade was for me, a call to a deepening of Spiritual values that have persisted until now. The principles, motto and deep spiritual lessons from the Bible gleaned during the Brigade gatherings formed the groundwork for my response to the Call of God to the Christian Ministry. After University I began teaching in 1955 re-joined Girls' Brigade and

qualified for the Christian Ministry in 1960 – received a call to Bethesda Congregational Church in 1964 when I was ordained into the Christian Ministry. It was then that I became a Chaplain in Girls' Brigade.

Throughout the succeeding years I retained the interest in Girls' Brigade and was instrumental in starting Companies in Hankey, Roodepoort, and Cape Town.

It was while ministering at Bethesda, Port Elizabeth, Hankey in the Eastern Cape and especially while ministering in Johannesburg and Roodepoort in Gauteng that I became thoroughly immersed in Brigade activities. It was a privilege to be present during the years when Mrs Ethelwynne Petersen as honorary secretary with her contemporaries in leadership were able to navigate Girls' Brigade through a rough period of challenge and setbacks. One can call it a period of resuscitation for when she became Secretary the Organisation was launched into a new era of positive development.

The World had survived the Second World War. We in South Africa now entered a challenging "bloody period of "Separate Development" also called "Apartheid". Imprisonment for being outspoken against the government of the day prevailed, forced removals and resettlement of entire communities took place. Many fled the country and lived in exile. In the meantime, forces were at work leading the population into a new period of Democracy. Of course, this called for tremendous readjustment until the new Democratic Regime came into being in 1994.

Yes, during this period Girls' Brigade was quietly busy filling a need in the lives of young girls. This was during the 1980s leading into the 1990s and into the new 21st Century. We are still on the go, and relevant in our own way.

It is during this period that at one stage I was elected to the position of President of Girls' Brigade, South Africa. I was also privileged to attend an International Girls' Brigade Conference in Brisbane, Australia, in 1998. I do hold thrilling memories of experiences but most of all of local efforts by Girls' Brigade to keep the work alive. Girls' Brigade seemed to thrive in the poorer communities. Yet, to my knowledge not a single conference had to be cancelled. Girls' Brigade met every single year. Officers gave their all to keep alive the flame of Christ's involvement in the organisation. I attended many meeting/conferences over the years and even after retiring to the Western Province in 2004 have been drawn into becoming involved in Girls' Brigade work in one way or another. I have also written a few pageants depicting the work and history of Girls' Brigade e.g. Road Signs.

While in Johannesburg during the 1990s Girls' Brigade South Africa, hosted the Africa Fellowship Girls' Brigade. Conference at the Youth for Christ Centre in Magaliesburg. It was eventful for me because there I met fellow Brigaders from other Africa States. You have no idea how invigorating and satisfying it is to just converse and worship with fellow sisters on a common mission: That of bringing young girls to faith in Jesus Christ.

At present, in 2018 the outcry from the people in RSA is genuine and urgent. Teenage pregnancies, abuse, HIV and Aids and poverty is the order of the day. The teaching of practical subjects such as needlework, knitting, crocheting and other forms of handcrafts have been taken out of the school curriculum. (These days young girls cannot even stitch a hem or sew on a button, let alone provide assistance in an accident. Is this not a chance for Girls' Brigade to come forward to fill the need?

At another level the Training In Leadership skills has become indispensable. Ironically this aspect of education (Girls' Brigade curriculum) has been adopted into the curriculum of State School as Training in Life Skills. It is also an aspect of Girls' Brigade Training which I feel may be extended into work in Christian Women's Groups. Leadership Training for women is imperative in the Corporate World and Social Structures need it. What with 60% of households in South Africa headed by women.

But there I go again. I shall always remain a Brigader. The Four-square programme of Girls' Brigade is at the centre of my life. It is essential in the development of the girl-child.

At present I am in a supernumerary by the Grace of God as nominated by the Girls' Brigade in the Western Cape. Their fortunes are the subject for my daily prayers. Their activities in which I can still participate as an octogenarian are close to my heart. The Christian principles and faith inculcated through my grounding received as a little girl in Girls' Brigade will live in me for as long as God wills.

May God reveal more truths and ways in which Girls' Brigade World-Wide may serve and nurture young girls for the Kingdom of God.

The devastation on the island was so great that Girls' Brigade was put on hold. Homes, buildings and crops (the main source of income) were destroyed.

The Leaders lost not just their homes but all supplies that were needed to run Girls' Brigade.

Girls' Brigade New South Wales wanted to help so the campaign to give every member of the Girls' Brigade in Vanuatu a Bible, was set in place. After research the Bibles were sourced through the Bible Society and purchased, both in English and French. And 18 months later the Bible arrived in Port Villa, to some very excited Leaders and girls.

The job to distributing them was given to Jill Qualao, the National Secretary. To get these Bibles around was not easy, as there are lots of Companies in isolated area. Well done Jill for accomplishing this job.

Nwani Cordelia Chimyenum's Story — Nigeria

While still so young, longed and craved to be in the Girls' Brigade. this was in the early 80's at St Paul's Anglican Church 2nd East Circular Road Benin City, Edo State, Nigeria though was not allowed by my parents up to the day of first enrolment. But still found myself being in Church on Saturdays while they hold their meetings. As time went by, I had the privilege to lead the Girls' Brigade members, the Company Captain/District Commandant Mrs Florence Oronsaye, appealed to me to teach and lead the girls, for a competition at the Edo State Youth Council, where we had an overwhelming victory. Interestingly I was not officially a member but still cherish the little I could do due to the effect of my parent's instructions, who then did not fully understand what Girls' Brigade entails.

But in April 2005, while a priest wife, we were mandated by the Bishop's wife, Mrs Gladys Imaseun, to train as Girls' Brigade Officers in order to take care of girls under our parishes. The training was held at St Pauls Anglican Church 2nd East Circular Road Benin City Edo State. I served under Mrs Oronsaye, Mrs G.N. Adams, Mrs Susan Urhuogo and Mrs C.I. Olotu. As a Captain at different parishes, I have helped to establish the 13th Oredo Company (Emmanuel Anglican Church Siluko Road), 17th Oredo Company (St Lukes Ogbeson) and 3rd Orhionmwon Company St Pauls Church Onuiyi-Ogbahu, where I currently oversee.

I am presently working with my Company to open a new Company at a village close to us. This we will do by the grace of God. I am privileged to serve as State Treasurer of Edo State Council of Girls, Brigade Nigeria. It has been God's help and grace helping to make girls followers of the Lord Jesus Christ.

I am glad to be a Girls' Brigader.

Joyful service in 6th Kuala Lumpur Girls' Brigade — Captain Marianne

My service with GBM started about a decade ago when I was called upon by my St Mary's Anglican Cathedral pastor to assist in the 6th Kuala Lumpur, which was (and still is) a school-based company. To be honest, when I was first asked to help out in this ministry, I had previously never heard of GB, nor was I aware of its existence. At the start, I felt extremely clueless as to how I would be able to be of service to Christ and the girls of 6th KL. However, what I found really appealing was the motto of GB, which defined what this organization stands for, which was to lead its members to "Seek, Serve and Follow Christ." One could not ask for a better ministry goal!

When I undertook the role of being 6th KL's captain in 2009, we had a good number of girls (around 37-40 girls). Even as I was holding this role, I would sincerely say that serving in this capacity was in fact a good learning curve for me. I'm thankful for the guidance and assistance from senior officers such as Madam Lum Choy Ying who came to carry out various activities with the girls in accordance

with the GB syllabus on a regular basis. I also thank God for teacher advisors Madam Joyce Lee and Madam Dayma Nyuawe who served alongside me as officers of 6th KL.

Over the years, we grew in number, by God's grace. Majority of the girls were from non-Christian homes. As the company grew in number, it became more challenging to know every GB member, personally. However, God was graciously at work in the hearts of these girls as they came regularly for meetings and heard the Gospel. I recall one young girl who was a faithful member and later began serving in the committee. I always assumed she was a Christian, until she finally told me that she first joined GB because she was attracted to the uniform! *She wasn't a Christian then, and she had never heard of* Jesus. As she began coming to the regular meetings, it was then that she first heard the Gospel, and understood the marvellous news that Christ had come to die on the cross for undeserving sinners (that's us!) and that Christ rose again defeating sin and death and is now King over all. She began joining the school's Christian Fellowship as well! When her younger sister entered school, she also encouraged her to join GB. Her younger sister wasn't a Christian but I'm most thankful to say that she too, has come to trust in Christ and is now serving as a committee member! All praise and glory be to God!

As of 2017, 6th KL's membership stands at 310 – 289 girls from SMK St Mary, and 21 girls from SK St Mary. Yes! It was by God's good hand that the ministry of GB extended to the primary school in 2016. One of the greatest challenge that we face as a company is the lack of manpower. God

has been gracious, volunteers from Scripture Union and St Mary's Cathedral came to the rescue. I also count it as an immense privilege to be involved in the various GB camps. In the process of serving in this capacity, I've come to admire the dedication and tireless labour of officers from other GB companies. I marvel at how many of them are committed to serving in their own companies and in the wider GB circle. I recognize that they do so out of their love and commitment to Christ and to the ministry He has entrusted them with. It has been a joy for me to see many girls grow in confidence and in their leadership abilities and in their knowledge of Christ as they attend the various GB camps through the years. It has been ten joyful years of service with the Girls' Brigade! My prayer is that God will raise up more and more leaders who are willing to be used in this ministry for the work of His Kingdom! And that through GB more and more girls will become faithful followers of our Lord Jesus Christ.


Fiona MacFarlane, 10th Dundee Company — Girls' Brigade Scotland

But currently, Girls' Brigade Thailand has made it to the next step, we have carried it into a Muslim community in the rural part of Bangkok, which all the girls and boys there are from Muslim based family. For me, it is a miracle that they show up to be part of us.

This mission is supported by Sapanluang Klongton Church, the Church that I'm a member of. Together with the Young Men's Brigade Thailand, we introduced the courses of Girls' Brigade into a community called Minburi. The Church rent a small room in a shopping centre at the community, for us to perform our duty there weekly on Saturdays. Each Saturday, there were about 10 children involved with us. I take charge as a Captain's assistant, getting support from the Headquarters, in planning and organising the course. At first, we faced some difficulties that distracted us to continue our work, so we have to find resolutions for it. A problem we faced

was that, one Saturday all the children did not show up. We received information that their parents did not approve for their child to join us. We decided to visit their neighbourhood the next Saturday to try work through the issue. Then, we recognised that it was just a misunderstanding, so we negotiate an understanding with the children and their parents. Saturday after that, the children showed up regularly.

For the past year of the accomplishment of Girls' Brigade and the Young Men's Brigade, our ministry is effective in some extent. The children are happy and excited to do new stuff with us and get knowledge, apart from what they learn in school. They are having a great time and get to know Jesus through the activities. One of them have already decided to receive Jesus Christ as their Saviour by themselves. We are looking forward for further success and what the children will get from Girls' Brigade and Young Men's Brigade. However, I am sure that all the children who are trained and moulded through Girls' Brigade and the Young Men's Brigade will definitely be a great example, efficiently and maturely in their family, school and community. Therefore, I would like to ask for your prayer supports so that our ministry can proceed smoothly, without any distraction, and also that it will affect Girls' Brigade and the Young Men's Brigade children's life fruitfully in any ways.



Rattawan Phuyu's Story

My name is Rattawan Phuyu, nickname Bean.

I am 21 years old and am studying in the third year of Ramkhamhaeng Open University, Faculty of Education and specialising in Pre-schoolers. At the same time, I am also working with the Santisuk Foundation in Chalongkrung.

I joined Girls' Brigade in the Chalongkrung Community since I was in primary school and continued on till I finished secondary school. At the moment I help teach Girls' Brigade to pre-schoolers in Baan Santisuk Daycare, in Chalongkrung.

At first, I just joined Girls' Brigade for fun but gradually I became a Young Leader, who helped to lead games, worship and drill, till I reached the rank of a Warrant Officer for the younger children in the different age groups.

I received many skills in Girls' Brigade, whether it be in Drill or training for leadership, or even just being a follower. I have learnt what it means to have selfdisciplined, for example, I had to prepare lessons beforehand, especially when teaching the toddlers, so I had to think through and plan out a programme that

will be appropriate and fun for the little ones in the Girls' Brigade.

Many of the children that are in the Day-care come from broken families, which are filled with problems, that impact their studies negatively. Parents are unable to give adequate attention to the needs of their young children, to train them, or help with the school work. Some children are smart, but because no one mentors them in the right path, they succumb to the evils of the neighbourhood.

The minds of the little ones are like white canvases, and whatever I draw on it stays for a long time, be it goodness, honesty, discipline, etc. Therefore, I firmly believe that as I teach them God's Word every day in the day-care, it will bear fruits one fine day in their lives when they grow up. Even if I do not see any tangible results today, I find it meaningful that little baby steps of improvements take place.

I am convinced that when these little ones leave the Day-care, they will not depart from the truth of God I their lives, just as Proverbs 22 verse 6 teaches, "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it."

Becoming a Brigader, made me become a person of integrity. I have learned to keep my word and learn to do the right thing even if no one was watching. I have learned that to help build a better future by training the girls in Girls' Brigade, that look up to me and I, as such, needed to be a person of integrity. And I say to the glory of God that I am proud to be a person with integrity. I have also learned to be an honest person, most especially with my girls. This, I have, realised is another way to build trust and be a trustworthy person as well. Selina's Story on How Girls' Brigade Has Impacted My Life

I was 9 years old when I joined Girls' Brigade, it was all for fun at first and I didn't know what Girls' Brigade was all about, as a grown up, I realised that 'Girls' Brigade is a home away from home'.

I lost my father when I was 8 and 2 years later my mother died. It was during this time that I felt and thought I was all alone, and by God's grace my aunt came to my aid and started living with them. I must say that being kept by people who are not your biological parents is not easy, but I endured through Girls' Brigade the woman, (Officer) I met when I first joined Girls' Brigade at my Company. She was the Mordecai I needed at that particular time. Every holiday's, when schools where closed, I would look forward to a Sunday just, so I should run away from home be at Girls' Brigade with my friends because I felt at peace and I felt at home. I hated being at home because as a child I felt I was not loved, and I was bitter as a child. When I joined Girls' Brigade, I discovered that there is Love, Joy, Peace, Care, Friendship, Family, Sisterhood and we were all treated equal.

Years went by and Girls' brigade introduced 'Junior Council' though mostly know it as the 'Youth Council'. This happened

during one of my first Girls' Brigade camp meetings, and when I went back, I organised my fellow girls in my region and shared my ideas with them. From there I was appointed the 'Junior Council' (Youth) Leader at my company. After six months our region Youth Leaders was elected, National Vice Youth Leaders and I became the Regional Youth Leader. A year later I became the 'Junior Council National Vice Chairperson' (National Vice Youth Leaders), where I served for six years.

During this time, I learnt a lot of things as a Leader and as a young child being led to join the Christian Organisation full of Christian values and norms. It was one Sunday afternoon when we learnt about being creative and using our hands for a good purpose, discovering what that purpose would be, in order to be independent and be financially sound. So, I sat own I started thinking what is it that I can do with my hands that will be able to help me be financially independent and take myself to college. After High School I stayed at home and I was known as the house maid, no one was willing to help or to take me to college. From there I found a job where I was getting paid \$30 per month, and it was okay because it was one of the things that would destruct me from thinking too much and maybe indulge in bad behaviour because of peer pressure. Which was rough to make saving because even at home they wanted something out of it and I ended up quitting.

In 2010 I started teaching myself on how to be creative, and I discovered that I could make invitation cards for Weddings, Bridal Showers, Birthday Parties, etc. It was not easy, but I still went ahead because I know I could, even if I didn't have the things to use, I just had to do this, and I told myself that failure is not my portion. I still struggled to get myself into college because the little I have, I realised it was hand to mouth because of the so many needs a girl child would want when they reach a certain age, and so I gave up.

5 years later in 2015, Girls' Brigade opened a website and I decided to have my own person to monitor and manage the website. After a meeting and looking at the interest I have in IT Girls' Brigade Zambia decided to take me on for a "Web Building and Development Program", and I can safely say Girls' Brigade raised my Hope and took away my shame. I am what I am today because of Girls' Brigade. I am able to design Billboards, Banners, Flyers, Bookmarks, Invitations, Cards etc. and I am now a Web Developer. My life has been impacted through Girls' Brigade and the skills they taught me.





even if I didn't have the things to use, I just had to and I told myself failure is not my portion. I still struggled to get myself into college because the little I would realise was hand to mouth because of the so many needs a girl child would want when they reach a certain age. And I gave up.

5 years later in 2015 girl's brigade opened a website and decided to have her own person to monitor and manage the website. After a meeting and looking at the interest I have in IT Girls Brigade Zambia decided to take me for "Web Building & Development Program", and I can safely say GB Raised my Hope and took away my shame. I am what I am today because of Girls Brigade. I am able to design Billboards, Banners, Flyers, Bookmarks,



Invitations Cards, etc and I am a WEB Developer. My life has been impacted through girls brigade and the skills they taught me.

Through Girls Brigade I am:

- A Web Developer
- Girls Brigade has turned my shame into glory
- I have learnt to accept and treat people with love, care and respect
- I am a leader with so many stories to tell and I stand for the truth and an advocate for a girl child's well being
- I have learnt to smile, laugh and Love everyone despite their backgrounds and where there come from, they all matter to me.
- I am and will be the true Definition of Queen Esther so that one day I can be the Modeccai to those that need encouragement, Love and Compassion.
- I am Confident, Courageous, full of energy and I smile....
- Above all through Girls Brigade I know God lives
- I am an Overcomer and it has made me realise that no situation is permanent.
